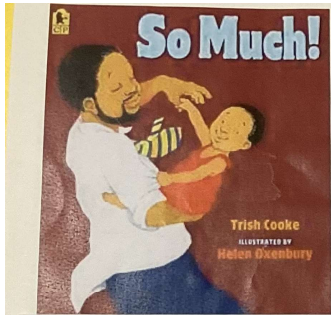


# Nursery



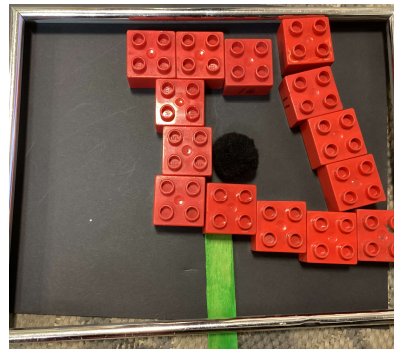
This week we had our first PE session with Coach Laura. We were developing our gross motor skills. It was great fun!
